December 5, 2007, BP/USA Tampa Bay Chapter Candlelight Ceremony. Sandy Boehning was one of our speaker presenters this year and this is her story as a <u>Bereaved Grandmother</u>! *Wonderful job Sandy and thank you for sharing!*

Walk with me across the street to Women's Hospital. As the elevator doors open to the second floor, we are met by a wall of tiny pink and blue feet bearing the names of babies born there. Five of those little feet represent my grandchildren, four pink and one blue. You see, I have five precious grandchildren, four I can hold in my arms, one only in my heart.

I was there with my son-in-law at that wonderful moment as the doctor placed their first-born child Caylee into my daughter's arms. I was here in this very hospital (St. Joseph's) as doctors placed this same child into her mother's arms, as Caylee's earthly life ebbed away. It was the worst moment in my life. But I was blessed to have four years of pre-



cious moments in between. Each school day I would pick up my granddaughters, Caylee and Riley.. The two little girls had a ritual. Riley would come only as far as the head of the walk and sit down, testing me. Caylee, even though petite, had a booming voice. As soon as she turned the bend to start up the walk, she would yell "GRANDMA" at the top of her voice. All the parents and grandparents waiting for the little ones would laugh, but what a joy it was to have someone so glad to see me.

Riley and Caylee would spend the rest of the day with me. Sometimes, we would go to a park, sometimes out to lunch, sometimes home to watch Lion King or Shrek. Later, when my granddaughter Morgan joined them, the girls would dress up and parade up and down the hallway with makeshift instruments as I hummed a John Phillips Sousa march. What a grand time we had and what wonderful memories.

Caylee was seldom sick. There was no indication of the disease, Acute Myeloid Leukemia, that would rob us of her dear life. She was ill only five days. Caylee's website, www.cayleeshope.com, tells the story of those five days and the toxins believed to have caused her illness. She was sweetly spoiled, loved every living thing, and adored the Disney princesses. Her particular favorite was Aurora, Sleeping Beauty. The wall in her room bears the words, "Once Upon a Dream," and those words seem so appropriate.

There are no words to truly tell of the heartbreak of losing a grandchild. We grandparents call this journey, double grief. We were in love with this precious child from the moment we knew our son or daughter would be a mom or dad.. The double grief is from the loss of this precious child and from the shattered dreams of our own child. We read the great pain on our child's face and know this is a time we can never make better. Our son or daughter is forever changed. We listen to our children, we cry with them, but we feel helpless.

Then too, we grandparents worry about our other grandchildren. Are we showing them they are as important as the one we no longer hold? It is very difficult to continue to do things with these dear ones when our hearts are broken, and a member of our team is missing, but they also need to know their grandparents love them.

Nina Bennett, has written a book, Forgotten Tears, in response to her own grief at the loss of her precious grand-daughter Maddy. I recommend this book for any grandparents here. All proceeds from this book go to AGAST, An Alliance of Grandparents; a Support in Tragedy. Some will ask how our children are doing, but few ask how we are, and a grandparent's grief is sometimes forgotten.

I was asked to share where my strength and courage come from. The truth is I am not strong nor courageous. I am simply propelled along by the great courage of incredible people - all of you here tonight who come to honor our children, my dear priest and his wife, who lost their four year old daughter and yet maintain such great faith, my dear friend Martha who never even saw her son Douglas who lived only nine hours ,yet her kindness to others is unmatched, the wonderful grandparents across the world who talk with me through AGAST, all the members of the Angel of Hope Committee who dedicate so much so our children will be forever remembered. Most of all, any courage I have comes from my daughter, Caylee's mother. In her precious child's memory, Dawn has been able to get other children to treatment. I know Caylee is so proud of her mommy.

Oh there are things I cannot do? I cannot walk on the walk where Caylee used to yell "Grandma." I cannot take my grandchildren to the Pizza Hut across from Busch Gardens where Caylee would always direct my attention to the "roller poster." I cannot sing the "Butterfly Song," but God has a funny way of forcing me to do things I don't think I can.

When I was asked to substitute for the kindergarten class, the class that would be Caylee's, I just knew I could not be with those children, so instead I agreed to sub for the Spanish class. Wouldn't you know the very first class to come in was Caylee's class. They remembered me as her grandma, and those dear little ones talked with me so naturally about my sweetheart.

On Caylee's website, Dawn has this. "Death is a comma, not a period." So until I reach the comma in my life, my precious Caylee, I can hold you only in my heart, but I will never let the world forget I have five grandchildren, and I love each one of you.

Buttons are round and measure approximately <u>2 1/4 inches in diameter</u>. If you are interested in having a button made,


be sure to bring a 3" to 4" <u>picture that will be on the button</u>.

But I still miss you so much and I wish I could hear your voice.


There's hardly an hour that goes by That I don't think of you and I try not to cry.



It's time to make plans to attend the BP/USA National Gathering, Seeds of Hope on July 11-13, 2008 at the Airport Crown Plaza, St. Louis, Missouri. While each National Gathering may have a different theme, each gathering offers a safe environment where we can share our feelings and concerns and have an opportunity to learn ways of coping from people who truly do understand our pain. This year's National Gathering is hosted by the Southern Illinois Chapter, Mt. Vernon, IL, with assistance from the Lewisburg West Virginia Chapter. The co-chairs for this event are Gene and Martha Honn from the Southern Illinois Chapter and Jack and Betty Ewart from the West Virginia Chapter.

If you have never attended a National Gathering, I encourage you to make <u>Seeds of Hope</u> your first one. After attending my first National Gathering in Dallas, Texas in 2001, I was "hooked." While I had support from family and friends, the National Gathering gave me the opportunity to spend an entire week-end with other bereaved parents, siblings and grandparents who were actively searching for tools to help them through this unwanted journey of grief. When you are newly bereaved, you are like a little seed thrown into a deep, dark place. You need nurturing and encouragement to begin to come up out of that place and who better to offer it than those who have walked that walk. By meeting others who have walked this walk, you see that they have somehow found the courage to reinvest in life. Those who are a little further down the road in their grief have acquired tools to help deal with the pain. By sharing coping tools each of us has acquired over the years, you will have the opportunity to help the newly bereaved come up out of that deep, dark place. <u>Seeds of Hope</u> will not only offer suggestions about how to handle your grief but the opportunity to meet and start friendships with other bereaved parents, siblings, grandparents and others from all over the United States. I'll look forward to seeing you at the 2008 National Gathering.

REGISTRATION

The Gathering will be from Friday July 11 to Sunday July 13, 2008. Plan to arrive on Thursday, July 10. There will be a get together program on Thursday evening. The opening ceremony begins at 9am on Friday, July 11. The Gathering ends Sunday morning with a special closing program. Registration for the Gathering shall be \$25 for each person with a maximum of \$75 for a family if postmarked by May 15, 2008. After May 15, the registration will be \$35 per person or \$85 per family. SO GET YOUR RESERVATIONS IN EARLY. Registrations at the Gathering may be by cash, check or, new this year, credit card. The Registration Form is included with these materials.

HOTEL

The Crowne Plaza Hotel - St. Louis Airport, 11228 Lone Eagle Dr., St. Louis, MO 63044, 314-291-6700 - Ask for In House Reservations, Tell them that you will be with BP/USA

The Crowne Plaza Hotel features an eight-story atrium with a waterfall as its focal point; its wide-open airy design lets light flood into the Gathering workshop areas. The Hotel has been very generous to discount the room rate to \$75 per night plus tax. Remember that it is your responsibility to make your own reservations by calling the number listed above. The hotel provides doubles, kings, non-smoking and handicap rooms. To reduce the rate further, up to four persons may share the room and the cost. Reservations must be made directly through the hotel. When making your reservations, ask for In House Reservations and inform them that you are attending the BP/USA Gathering so that you will receive the special discounted rate. RESERVATIONS MUST BE MADE BY JUNE 15, 2008 in order to take advantage of the discounted room rate. Rooms are available, at the same cost, for 3 days before and 3 days after the Gathering. So get those reservations in early!

MEALS
The Hotel is noted for their excellent cuisine! Meal times have been planned so that we all eat together. During the meals there will be programs dedicated to our for presentations and sneakers. The cost for meals Friday thru Sunday is children so please plan to join us. After meals, we will remain in the Grand Ballroom for presentations and speakers. The cost for meals Friday thru Sunday is \$118.00 all inclusive (meals/gratuity). It will also be possible to purchase separate meals. After the scheduled meals have been served, those without meal tickets will be admitted to the room in order to hear the program. To save money for everyone, we have not scheduled breakfast on Fri. and Sat. If you plan to eat in the hotel restaurant, plan to be there early in order to eat and get to the Speakers on time each morning. There is limited seating in the restaurant. Mitch Carmody will speak about the effects the death of a child has on the extended family. Norma Sawyers-Kurz's will speak about coping with grief and rebuilding life after the loss of a child. Alan Pedersen will be with us again presenting his great music. Video/DVDs will be made of the meal speakers and an order form will be available at the Gathering to purchase these. Books and recordings of speakers and workshop presenters will be available in the Book Store.
