WHAT I DID ON MY SUMMER VACATION!

As I see summer coming to an end and the children preparing for a new school year, I remember that dreaded first assignment in grade school: "What I did on my summer vacation!" I knew my boring trips to visit the extended family didn't compare to the exotic trips that included hotels and campgrounds and national parks like so many others.

Fast forward 40 some years; it's still not the "summer vacation" that most would dream of, but it's mine.

Two events stand out: a four-day seminar at the National Academy of Bereavement where I learned the anachronism S.T.U.G. For many years, bereavement counselors believed that it was abnormal for the healing path of the bereaved to have huge, overwhelming valleys of pain interrupt their "normal journey". Dr. Christine Rando recognized these as being very normal responses to a sensory experience. In other words, a sound, a smell, a picture, etc. would trigger a S.T.U.G. (Sudden Temporary Upsurge of Grief). How well we know that these are normal, very common events in our new abnormal lives.

At the Bereaved Parents National Gathering, I learned another new term: "Civilians". It describes those fortunate people who are not bereaved. Such a simple term, but it says so much! We have been drafted into a whole new society; we are, and always will be bereaved parents.

So, what did I bring away from my summer vacation trips? Some new knowledge and understanding to carry on my grief journey and a renewed appreciation for those who choose to take the pain of their loss to help people just like me.

Were either of these trips the summer vacation I always dreamed of? Of course not! But it's mine.

That is why we are here together as we share our tender moments we can scream and cry, laugh or rage expressing the emotions of our laments

> In giving we shall receive and forget our pain for awhile be able to laugh again and attempt and honest smile

This is not an easy task for our energy is constantly drained we have to be selfish and good to ourselves or lose anything we have gained

We can only give what we have so let yourself receive let people know of your pain show them that you still grieve

Even good people tend to forget not seeing things with our eyes their ears don't hear what we hear they do not perceive our inner cries.

Some people are helpful, some are not we have to pick and choose catch a stranger unawares and unload your pent-up blues. Openly weep your sorrow express that anger that lies inside explore every avenue you can find those fears that tend to hide

Talk about IT whenever you can for IT colors your very being every atom of your essence that affects the way you are seeing

As unpredictable as grief is, one can expect that the holidays, birthdays, and anniversaries that were important, shared times with your loved one will cause a huge wave of emotion. These events, once anticipated with joyous pleasure, are now often painful reminders that your loved one is not here to celebrate with you. The good news is that you can help yourself.

Something to keep in mind as this holiday season approaches: for many, the anticipation of a holiday is worse than the actual day. Make a plan for the holiday that is approaching. If it is difficult to decide what you want to do, think about what you don't want to do. Discuss your plan with your family. Don't fool yourself into thinking you can ignore the holiday in hopes it will go away. Everywhere you look, you will probably be reminded that this is a holiday season. Stores will be decorated, there will be holiday ads in the newspaper and on TV. People will greet you with a "happy" or a "merry" something or another. And it is not a happy or merry time for you.

Holidays are different for each person. One particular holiday may be very difficult for you but a breeze for others. A particular holiday may not have much meaning for some, but if your family always hosted a huge neighborhood costume party, on that particular holiday you will really feel your loss on that day.
